



SUPPORTING THE CHILDREN

While a woman is rebuilding herself, children experience the benefits of a structured daily routine and a safe predictable environment, including:

- Quality early care and learning
- Supportive Learning-Enriched Environment
- Social and Emotional Support
- School Readiness
- Parental Education



LEVEL 1 ENROLLMENT

STABILIZATION (MONTH ONE)

Highly Structured, Supported and Guided:

- Closed campus except for Sunday
- Participation centered no room access, sleeping, or TV during the day
- Sober and smoke-free environment
- Moms have daily chores, inside and outside of their rooms

Respite Program

- Offers women and children experiencing a mental health crisis to stabilize and create a short-term action plan
- Capacity to serve 3 women and up to 7 children daily
- Up to 7 day length of stay

Individualized Learning Plan:

- Assessment followed by targeted case management and mental health counseling
- Alcohol and Other Drug Therapy
- Budgeting and savings program
- Parenting
- Healthy Relationships
- Exercise and Wellness
- Employment-Training Readiness
- Active integration of children into their school community



LEVEL 2 ENROLLMENT

VOC TRAINING AND SELF-DEVELOPMENT (MONTHS TWO-FOUR)

- Three days/week hands-on Employment Training in two restaurants or child development center:
 - Plates Café/Plates Midtown
 - First Steps Child Development Center
- Children beginning to "catch up" in school
 - Moms more active in their children's education
- Continued Case Management and Mental Health Therapy



- Expanded educational classes and activities:
 - Exercise and Wellness
 - Alcoholics Anonymous and Narcotics Anonymous offered onsite
 - Life Skills
 - Technology-basics
 - High School Enrollment
 - Job-Readiness
 - Giving back/Community Service requirement
 - Acknowledgements/awards introduced to support positive actions



LEVEL 3 ENROLLMENT

ADVANCED EMPLOYMENT TRAINING POSITIVE NETWORK DEVELOPMENT (MONTHS FIVE-SIX)

- Lighter case management, therapy, classes
- Educational focus shifts to building a positive support network
- Hands-on employment training at least four days/week
 - Goal: 300-450 hours of job preparation
 - Job search begins through Career Education Center

- Communal housing facility, Our Second Story, for up to 15 Level-3 families
 - Less structured than Levels 1 and 2
 - Several classes onsite including weekly community meeting
 - Participant-driven meals
 - Lightly-staffed
- Childcare and transportation continue to be provided
- Moms playing an active role in their children's education



LEVEL 4 ENROLLMENT

JOB ACQUISITION AND SELF RELIANCE (MONTHS SEVEN-EIGHT)

- 96% advancing to this stage are placed in employment
 - Initially start at 20-25 hours/week
 - As moms stabilize in employment, support offered for advancing to full-time work

- High School Diploma achievement
- Independent Housing Partnerships
 - Individual apartment units in a community with other working families
 - Rent support continues for up to six months
 - Moms now the primary provider for their families
 - Ongoing, case management including continued:
 - Employment support
 - Mental health support
 - Educational support
 - Childcare program



LEVEL 5 ENROLLMENT

FAMILY SUSTAINABILITY AND COMMUNITY INVOLVEMENT (MONTH NINE+)



- Women are paying their full rent
- Children continue to be active and progressing in school
- Well-developed planning and decisionmaking skills
- Functional support network
- Community connectedness and involvement








An Emergency Shelter serving up to 100 women and children/day








FUNDING PICTURE TODAY

OUR IMPACT

— \$13 MILLION —

Taxpayer Savings in 2016

- Saint John's served and housed 522 women and children in 2016
- Clients receive up to 460 hours of "hands-on" employment training services
- Clients receive up to 1,200 hours of mental health counseling, education and fiscal training
- Clients remain drug and alcohol free for up to 18 months... and beyond
- 96% of clients who complete employment training are placed in non-subsidized employment
- Budget expanded from \$1.1 M emergency shelter— one that was 80% reliant on public funding-- to a \$5.7 M program helping women and children change the trajectory of their lives



IN A NUTSHELL

It begins by approaching each woman and child as an **individual**

It includes **self-reliance** versus an entitlement

It includes structure and 'life rules' (giving back, budgeting, etc.)

It includes providing **comprehensive** 'dependence-to-independence' services, all-under-one-programmatic roof and is unparalleled in the state*
